One day, one choice and one prayer changed teenager Joni Eareckson's life forever.

oni Eareckson took what she describes as a "really stupid dive" into what ended up being extremely shallow water.

As a result her head snapped back as she hit the bottom of the water, crunching four of her vertebrae, which resulted in the severing of her spinal cord. Joni couldn't move a muscle.

There she was, lying face down in the water, desperately hoping that her sister Kathy, who had invited her out to the beach for a swim, would notice that she had not surfaced from her dive. But Kathy's back was to Joni and she hadn't even seen her dive off the raft! The minutes stretched longer and longer. Joni thought she was going to die.

Joni had had a happy childhood, growing up in a very athletic family who were very involved in tennis and horse-back riding.

"My earliest memory of hearing about the God of the Bible was around a campfire on the beach," Joni says. "I was with my sisters, my Mom, and my Dad, hearing stories of Noah, Moses, David, and Daniel. But God wasn't really personal to me."

All that changed though, when, at 14 years old, Joni went away on a church weekend retreat. She was challenged by the speaker there who asked the kids to measure their lives up against the Ten Commandments.

"As I measured my life up against those Commandments," Joni recalls, "one by one by one ... I got this overwhelming sense that I was missing the mark; that I was not going to make it."

Joni shares that she was hit with the realisation of why Jesus had come to Earth. He was the only One who kept the Commandments even when she didn't and even when she couldn't.

"I was only 14," Joni remembers with a smile, "but I was able to reach out and embrace Jesus and say, 'I need You."

Joni returned home, very excited about her new faith. Through high school, however, the enthusiasm of what she had done began to wane.

"My prayers became very selfcentred," she states. "I prayed things like, 'God, I need to lose weight,' 'God, I need a new boyfriend,' 'God, I need good grades on this test'. Unfortunately, I thought I had done God a great big favour by accepting Jesus as my Saviour."

Towards the end of high school, Joni was convicted about the way she was living. She prayed, "Lord, I'm not doing this Christian thing right and I know it. I don't want to go to college and defame Your Good Name. I know it's far more than about me so do something in my life to jerk it right side up because I'm really living this life wrong."

Just a few weeks after Joni's high school graduation, Kathy took her to the beach for a swim. There, Joni made the dive that tipped the entire course of her life upside down.

"As I was lying in the water," Joni shares sadly, "Kathy got bitten by a crab. She was so startled, she turned around quickly and called out to me, 'Joni, watch out for the crabs!' It was then that she saw my blonde hair floating on the surface of the water. I was ready to drown. Kathy swam over and pulled me out of the water. I was never so grateful for fresh air!"

Kathy had saved Joni. But for what purpose? For what reason? Joni couldn't help but wonder.

Lying in the hospital, Joni was

told by the doctors that she would have to sit down for the rest of her life as a quadriplegic without the use of her legs and arms.

schools my nieces go to.


So many knock on effects from one decision.

"About 45 minutes later, the atheist stood up in anger and frustration and demanded: 'If your God is so real, why do you have those braces on your legs? Tell me that!' And Bobby calmly answered: 'So that you could trip over my legs, ask me that question and we could have this conversation.'

"You see, God reveals Himself in some of the most unbelievable ways. All you have to do is pay attention," Greg concludes.

A Bible verse that they shared with Joni was from Jeremiah chapter 29 verse 11: "I know the plans I have for you, plans not to harm you, but to help you, plans to prosper you, and to give you a hopeful future."

At first, Joni couldn't understand why the Lord had allowed her to become a quadriplegic if He had plans to prosper and help her. But. as she read the context around the verse, she began to understand.

"God's plans for a hopeful future for me was not necessarily me jumping up, dancing, kicking, running, walking, and getting back the use of my arms and legs," Joni explains. "No. God's plans for me go far deeper. A deeper healing - of my soul. When God says He won't harm us, it doesn't mean the body, or our circumstances. He is not going to do anything that will harm our soul! Our body may be harmed, yes, but it will somehow search to enrich our soul!"

A quadriplegic of 46 years, the sufferer of chronic pain and the victim of breast cancer, Joni still continues to praise God for her many blessings.

Joni is happily married to Ken Tada. They have no children, but

Which is why, when I was driving for an hour to an appointment with






Sudoku

Saudi finds his Saviour

For Dr Khalid Al Shammari, his honeymoon in the United States was not just the beginning of a happy marriage, or an interesting holiday in

For Dr Khalid Al Shammari, his honeymoon in the United States was not just the beginning of a happy marriage, or an interesting holiday in another culture; it became the beginning of a spiritual journey that would impact every aspect of his life.

halid grew up in a Muslim home and lived his whole life in Jeddah and Mecca. At King Abdulaziz University he specialised in microbiology and eventually got his Master's degree in bacteriology.

"I DIDN'T

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SEARCHED

In 1997, he and his wife honeymooned in the States, where a group of Christians tried to convince him of the truth of their religion, and he them of his. They challenged him to pray and ask whether Jesus is God. Khalid did, but nothing happened initially.

"After several months, I had a dream," he shares in his Youtube testimony, "and I knew from it that Christ is God, who suffered on the cross instead of me. But I could not admit this openly.

"Because of this dream, I decided to read the Bible so that I could know the facts before making any decisions. I searched the Christian sites in Arabic. I found that the Bible consists of the Old and New Testaments, the old for the Jews and the new for the Christians. I decided to download the New Testament that belongs to the Christians and read it."

Khalid did this and through his

reading realised: "I was supposed to die for my own sins and not [Jesus] Christ the righteous one. But He decided to leave heaven and to be crucified – to die in my place. I asked myself: why?"

Khalid says the answer is in John 3:16 – because Jesus loved us even though we were unworthy of that love, He chose to pay the price to wash us clean of sin so that we can be in eternal relationship with Him.

In the New Testament, Khalid saw that Jesus often referred to other writers like Daniel and Isaiah, or said "it is written".

"I asked myself, 'Where is it written? Who are these prophets?' A simple search led me to the Old Testament. It was as if God was saying, 'The Book of the Jews is my Word too. Read it so that the truth can be clear. See that those who lived before Christ knew of His coming and waited for Him in faith."

So Khalid downloaded and read the Old Testament and was interested to find that many of the teachings and practices of the Jews are still found today in Saudi traditions.

"I found many things of great interest to me. I came across a verse that said: 'You clothe me with skin and flesh and knit me together with bones and sinews.' (Job 10:11) I almost fell off my chair in surprise, crying 'God is great'! My wife asked me, 'What is going on?' I told her: 'The Bible mentions the details of the foetal formation in the mother's womb in a precise scientific way, contrary to what is in the Koran."

Khalid and his wife asked a Muslim embryologist and imams about the contradiction between the Koran and the science regarding this point. Surat 23:12-14 of the Koran says: "And certainly did We create man from an extract of clay. Then We placed him as a sperm-drop in a firm lodging."

No one could explain the problem to the couple's satisfaction. However, it did cause Khalid to be reported several times for apostasy and eventually blacklisted.

He believed it was time to flee Saudi Arabia and told his wife they would have to divorce, as it is illegal for a Muslim woman to be married to a Christian man.

"I love you and want you to be with me," he said. "Choose for yourself."

She said: "I want to be with you." Khalid warned her of the dangers,

khalid warned her of the dangers, but his wife decided to stay with him in the hopes of winning him back to Islam.

However, after studying in-depth and comparing the teachings of Islam to the teachings of Christ, she too became a Christian.

On October 17, 2003, Khalid planned to flee to Jordan but did not know how he would get out of Saudi

because of the travel blacklisting. For a week he prayed from Psalm 91:1 "Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty."

"On the day of travel, I said: 'Lord, I am not expecting you to open the Red Sea for me, nevertheless, please let me out of this dilemma in your way.'

"I was not demanding a miracle, as His existence in my life is the best miracle of all," explains Khalid. "Nevertheless, God gave me a miracle for at the time when I was boarding my flight, the immigration computer was shut down and the official couldn't check the records!"

Today Khalid preaches to thousands through Al Haya Arabic Christian TV.

"The whole credit is to the Lord Jesus Christ," Khalid asserts. "I didn't search for God, but He searched for me and found me. He saved me and my family.

"He is the only true living God who hears and responds and loves the people whom He created. God loves all people but He hates sin. Come today and know my Lord, Jesus Christ, because He is close.

"Words are unable to describe the joy that Christ has given me. I know this, that you too can experience this joy. Please consider the claims and the works of Christ," he urges.

Breaking out of an icy grip

Twenty-three-year-old Jayden was a fearful addict, but then he started to pray

was bullied at school and dropped out in grade nine after I was offered a chef's apprenticeship.

But a relationship breakdown when I was 20 caused me to start using drugs, specifically ice. I grew up with quite a lot of pain in my life from my mum and dad's divorce, so when my relationship broke down, I really didn't know how to deal with it.

When I used ice, it took away the pain.

I had over a year of intense addiction and there were a few rock-bottom moments. Just before Christmas, I knew my son was being born, but I wasn't allowed to see him and I threatened to kill people in the hospital. I hated the person I'd become — I just wasn't that aggressive person at all.

People were chasing me for the money I owed. I was going to be killed. I called my dad, and he gave me the money but the condition was that I had to enter rehab.

I went to a Recovery Services Centre but I was just an immature kid and threatened somebody on the program, so they asked me to leave.

I went to stay with someone close by who I knew had drugs, and I became psychotic. I was hiding in a public toilet thinking people were chasing me but there was no real threat. It was all in my head but I just couldn't escape — it was horrible.

Then a lot of really amazing things happened and I now look back and see God was there. It was



during that time I prayed my first prayer.

I knew they had no room in rehab, but my prayer was if that was where I was meant to be I'd get a place, and I did!

In my first few weeks back at the Recovery Centre, nothing much changed – but I kept praying even though I didn't know who God was. (I thank God for praying grandmas, because I found out later that mine prayed for me every day).

Then, one night, I looked up out of my window and it all got super bright and I saw a white light coming towards me and it gently kissed my face. I know now it was the Holy Spirit. Then, just as suddenly, it was gone and I fell asleep feeling truly safe and secure for the first time in a

very long time.

I did the rehab program and gained a determination and confidence that I never had before.

While I had my moments, God gave me this huge motivation. I was so determined that I did every extra course offered. I made a great friend in there who had my back, and I was invited to spiritual camps and conventions. I spend Saturday with family, but Sundays mean church services morning and night.

It seems God was truly guiding me every step of the way. While in recovery I heard they wanted to start cooking classes, so I applied and said, "I'm a trained chef and I'd be happy to teach people to cook."

I ran a course and later applied to become a fulltime chef at the center.

To me, it is heaps more than a job.

Because I've come straight off the program, a lot of participants come up and talk openly and the chefs' office I share has become a prayer room.

God has also brought a beautiful Christian girl into my life and we are planning our future together.

I know I'm still young, but I've experienced a lot in my life already and the one thing I am absolutely sure of is that God transforms lives! ullet

One of the most recognisable characters on TV, cinema, animation and computer games is Lawrence Tureaud or Mr. T.

verybody knows the man with that signature mohawk haircut, tough and intimidating image and past extravagant

jewelry wearing. But certainly not all people know that Mr. T is a devout Christian and often describes himself as a "tough mama's boy".

Although his trademark hair and scowl are unchanged from the years since he played Sergeant. B.A. Baracus on 1980s hit TV show The A-Team, all the

actor's signature gold chains are gone since Hurricane Katrina.

"As a Christian, when I saw other people lose their lives and their land and property ... I felt that it would be unnecessary and disrespectful before God for me to continue wearing my gold," he explains.

He is characteristically outspoken about his faith and the practical way he feels it should be expressed to


On Twitter in April 2014 he wrote:

"I boldly confess that I am A Christian! I believe in GOD! His son Jesus and I am Not Ashamed!! (Matthew

> "I am a sinner who has been saved by grace. It is by the grace (undeserved love) of God that I'm here. We all have sinned and fallen short of God's glory. I come home and I ask God to forgive me for my sins. Every day I ask for a new cleansing," he told worldreligionnews.com

When asked about when he first decided to follow Christ, Mr.

T says in a YouTube interview that the hand of God was on him from a very young age when he used to be the Bible bearer in his preacher father's church services, and listened

to gospel messages on the radio with his mother.

At 13 he was baptized in water by his father as an outward symbol of the faith he professed, but it was only in 1995 when he was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer that the mettle of his belief was really tested.

"The story of Job gave me strength when I had cancer. Job said to God, 'Though You slay me, yet will I trust You. God giveth and God taketh away. Blessed be His holy name.' And that's how I live. You know I came with nothing, I'm going to die with nothing. But in between them two points that's what it's all about.


"I ain't going to say I was 100% [faith-filled] all the time," Mr. T admits. "But I never really faltered. I cried, I ate, I got mad, I said I wouldn't do things. That was my Job test. As I'm going through things, if I didn't read the book of Job I guess I would have fallen apart. I could have said, 'What kind of God does this and that?' But no, I understood God said it would get rough and tough.'

Cancer clarified his priorities: "My fame couldn't save me! My gold, my money, couldn't stop cancer from appearing on my body. If they can't save me, then I don't need them.

"We have got to keep our eyes on the prize, every day," the Rocky III actor encourages. "You might not have the things you want, but if you check carefully, you got all you need.

"And it's hard for some people to get believing," he acknowledges. "They say, 'But I've been hurt by so many people and by some churches, or whatever.' I explain that wasn't God. God didn't do that to you. That's somebody else. Because God will still love you even if you give up on Him."

Mr. T rails against "secret service" Christians who don't want anybody to know they love Jesus, and says Chris-

tians should "come out of the closet" and live out their faith by meeting the needs of their communities.

"If God has touched me, I've got to touch somebody else. God has forgiven me, so I've got to forgive the people who did me wrong. If Jesus can forgive all things—with the crown of thorns upon his head on the cross..., then I've got to forgive. If I don't forgive, I'm not a follower. If I'm not kind, if I don't share, I'm not a follower, I'm a liar. I can't be greedy."

So when a Japanese company offered the tee-totalling Mr. T almost a million dollars to do a beer commercial he said, "I won't do it." He says it would have made him a liar and a fraud.

"I say to the Lord, 'when they see me, let them see you' so you know I can't be coming out of the strip bar with a couple women on my arm. And I say 'Lord, when they hear me let them hear you'--that means I can't be telling them the nasty jokes I used to tell. Because the Bible says, Christ makes you a new creature, old things are passed away. I'm not the same man I used to be, I'm not out hell-raising, and doing stuff like that.

"I am a changed man. When I step out, I'm representing the God I serve."

What makes humans special?

IN the preamble to the United Nations declaration to human rights it recognizes "the inherent dignity ... and inalienable rights of the members of the human family".

Everyone agrees with this statement but why should humans have more rights that some species of animals?

Evolutionary psychologist Robin Dunbar wrote: "It is hard to escape the conclusion that religion is the one phenomenon in which we humans really are different in some qualitative sense from our ape cousins."

Few want to admit this truth, but the dignity and worth of humanity is not about intelligence and ability, but the concept that we have the spark of God within us.

Here is how we are different, this is why we have a conscience, and what underpins our creativity. The gift of the divine marks humanity out as unique.

WHAT WILL HEAVEN BE LIKI

WHEN someone says "heaven", what do you think of? Wings, harps and clouds? Doing your favourite thing all day? A bland place with lots of singing?

Many people define heaven by the things that make them feel happy and fulfilled on Earth, but what if I were to tell you that in heaven there is no marriage, no sex, no Wi-Fi, no computer games, no Netflix, no sport and probably no sleep. Would you still want to go?

The Bible actually tells us very little about heaven. But when Jesus was told about a woman who had had seven husbands and asked whose she would be in heaven, He made it clear that in the afterlife there is no marriage or sex. "When the dead rise, they will neither marry nor be given in marriage; they will be like the angels in heaven."

In the glimpses the Apostle John had of heaven, as recorded in the biblical book of Revelation, it was a place of worship – with crowds standing around the throne of God singing praises and bowing before Him.

So, if heaven is not a place where we get to do whatever we want, or gratify all the desires we have on earth, why is it somewhere we would want

Well, the people who want to go to heaven want to be there for one reason only. One thing makes heaven, heaven and the absence of that one thing makes hell the most awful, fearful place it is. That one thing is Jesus.


The people who want to go to heaven want to be there because Jesus is there.

He is the embodiment of love, mercy, kindness, goodness and truth. All our deepest longings are fulfilled in Him and therefore the yearning of those who know Him, who call themselves Christians, is to be where He is.

That is why there is so much worship in heaven. Not because it is forced, like some sort of long boring church service, but because everyone there is so overcome by God's goodness and so grateful that He has extended that goodness to them, that they cannot but praise Him endlessly.

The Bible makes two other important points about the afterlife that are also relevant.

Firstly, our desires and lusts will not be fulfilled in hell either. Hell is no endless debauched party. Jesus describes it as a blazing furnace, where



there is weeping and gnashing of teeth. (Matthew 13:42) It is a place of torment, devoid of any of the goodness, light, purity or happiness that we may know on earth.

Secondly, heaven is not the final destination of those who trust in Jesus for their salvation. John tells us in Revelation 21: "Then I saw "a new heaven and a new earth," for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any

sea. I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and He will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. 'He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death' or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." (verses

Ultimately, there will be a new Earth and Revelation gives us only a few clues as to what it will be like but for those who know and love Jesus only one fact is important – He will be there and we will never be apart from Him again.

Search for peace leads transgender to find true identity Laura Perry today,

aura Perry experienced a tumultuous life during her teen years, having struggled with her sexuality for most of her childhood.

"I had always had feelings of wanting to be a boy as a young child," Laura says. "I was very athletic and enjoyed sports. I didn't get along with girls very well. I was uncomfortable being a girl.

"By my 20s, I fully embraced the transgender lifestyle," Laura admits sadly. "I called myself 'Jake' and lived as a transgender 'man' for eight years. I took opposite sex hormones and underwent a double mastectomy and a full hysterectomy to remove my female organs."

Laura lived with a partner who also identified as a transgender, attended pro-LGBT support groups and moved towards having more surgery to become less feminine.

However, she had grown up in a godly Christian home and was raised attending church, Bible study and a Christian school.

Although Laura had a lot of head knowledge of Jesus, she never had a personal relationship with Him.

"As a child, I had a lot of confusing thoughts about my identity," Laura recalls. "I was often told that God had created me perfectly and hadn't made any mistakes, but over time I began to get very angry with God. If He had created me perfectly, then why did I feel this way? Why did I struggle with this so much? Over the years, this created a lot of bitterness and frustration in

"All I could see was the things God had not given me, I didn't even see all the things He had given me and blessed me with. I started to really doubt my faith."

Laura, in her desperation, honestly thought that being transgender "would make her happy".

When Laura accepted the transgender life style, her parents, Francine and Paul, never ceased to pray for her.

"Their prayers weren't really offensive," Laura states. "But I was more offended that they didn't accept me. I wanted them to affirm me as a man."

All the while, though, Laura was miserable and searching for real peace.

"I'D NEVER **FELT SO MUCH** PEACE AND LOVE BEFORE"

"Two or three years after I became a transgender male, I remember thinking, 'I am still no happier than I was before.' I felt a bit like a hamster on a wheel. I had no purpose. I thought becoming who I really wanted to be would finally give me what I was looking for, but it left me empty.'

Laura admits that her heart remained cold until, through a series of miraculous doings, God slowly began to draw her back to Him.

It started with prayer.

"My mom, Francine, turned to her ladies Bible study group for prayer. They prayed earnestly for me to turn away from the sin I was living in," Laura says. "My mom was crushed to the core by how I was living. These ladies' prayers were also releasing God's healing in her too."

Laura's transgender partner was politically conservative and got Laura into radio talk shows. This eventually led Laura to listen to the Christian

"One of the biggest influences was when my Mom asked me to work on her website for her Bible study," Laura shares. "I was a programmer and she needed a website built, so I knew it wasn't intentional on her part to try and win me back.

"I started reading her notes and over time, I just got really curious. She was finding things in the Bible I had never seen or heard before. I began asking her questions about Christianity and the Christian faith, which opened up the door for communication with

All along, Laura had considered herself a Christian because of her upbringing, but as God opened her eyes to the truth, she realized how wrong she was.

"Slowly but surely," Laura explains, "God worked in me, making me realize that the transgender life was a dead-end."

Things didn't change overnight. Laura "was still conflicted" but after reaching a particularly low point in her life, she tearfully asked the Lord to help her.

One day, she asked her mother, "Is it OK if I come to church?'

At first, Francine was worried that if Laura came to church as a "man" it would cause embarrassment, but "grace won out".

"It was a turning point in my life," Laura says excitedly. "In August 2016, I gave my life to Jesus."

Laura broke up with her transgender partner and moved back home with her parents. It was a decision that she said came after much struggling.

"A lot of people these days tell me, 'Well that's good for you, whatever makes you happy,' but me leaving that lifestyle had nothing to do with me being happy," Laura admits. "It was extremely hard for me to leave it. I did not want to be a girl. I had no

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Laura started attending her mother's women's Bible study and was amazed because she didn't know that they had been praying for her.

"When I first came home, the first three days were extremely difficult for me," Laura says. "I just felt like I was dying and it was extremely painful. Then my Mom laid out in front of me some cards that these women had written to me. I just sat at the kitchen table, sobbing, as I read them. I couldn't believe the love that these women had for me - and they hadn't even met me."

she was surrounded by women who were kind, welcoming, and filled with

joy because of her repentance.

"It was amazing," Laura declares. "I'd never felt so much peace and love before. I am so humbled by all that God has done."

God has healed the mother-daughter relationship between Laura and Francine.

Laura has now fully embraced her God-given sexuality as a woman, her story being one of God's amazing undeserved kindness and redemption.

"I am living proof that God's love is greater than the devil's lies," she testifies.

Confronted by the Second Law of Thermodynamics

Warren Nunn chats with engineer Colin Gibson on his journey from evolution to creation

rofessional engineer Colin Gibson was raised in a church where he was taught six-day creation in Sunday school but that grounding was challenged at high school when evolution and millions of years were presented as fact in his science class.

That left him confused and thinking that he must have been taught fairytales at Sunday school.

"I didn't even suspect the State school I attended would have lied and therefore I believed the evolution story taught there was true," Colin remembers.

"There was no point attending church, so I stopped attending and led a very secular lifestyle. Throughout the remainder of my schooling, including two years at a 'Christian' private school, I was taught plenty of evolution but zero creation.'

Colin enjoyed watching scientific TV documentaries but was puzzled by statements about species that referred to changes within animals as 'adapting to their environment'.

While studying engineering and computer programming at university he continued to have 'nagging doubts' about creatures 'adapting' from one kind to another.

"I could never really understand what the mechanism was that actually made the animals 'adapt'," he

He wrestled with why documentaries glossed over the 'how' of the adaptation as if it didn't need any justification.

"What magic mechanism rewrote the DNA software to make the animal 'adapt' and change it to another kind of animal, especially before the change in environment killed it? Writing my own software at uni was hard enough and took a lot of thought, so how did DNA get re-written with no effort? What was the mechanism?'

Colin knew how much intelligence was required in engineering design and, even then, any prototype machine typically didn't function as intended and needed to be modified.

He said: "Programming computers and designing machines are difficult tasks requiring a lot of brain power. Random guessing and mistakes simply don't produce the desired results. So exactly how did animals just magically 'adapt' without any intelligence input? How did they redesign themselves and accurately reprogram their own DNA software error free? Wouldn't it be nice to have that same magic which would make programming and designing things easy?'

As he continued in his engineering studies, he came to understand the Second Law of Thermodynamics, which led to some interesting discussions.

"In our mechanical engineering class we would argue amongst ourselves about this. How can things evolve at all when the Second Law of Thermodynamics says everything will ultimately degrade?

"Our lecturer at the time simply dismissed our questioning and said 'the Second Law doesn't apply to living things'.

"To us, this meant evolution could still occur and therefore there was no God to worry about. His statement was completely false of course, but we didn't know any better at the time, so we all continued on with our

> somewhat degenerate lifestyles, thinking there was no God to fear."

Long after university in 1991, Colin decided to attend a creation/ evolution talk by Dr Carl Wieland fully expecting to hear how evolution fits in with the Bible.

Instead, when Dr Wieland pointed out that evolution was scientifically at odds with the Second Law of Thermodynamics, the 'lights went on' for Colin.

He said: "I knew nothing can violate the Second Law of Thermodynamics and I knew that designing things takes a lot of intelligence, not random chance. I knew the Second Law meant things go downhill and

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get worse, not uphill and better."

Colin said at that point he understood why TV documentaries and university lectur-

ers never gave satisfactory explanations but continued to advocate evolution regardless.

Now, for Colin, evolution was the fairytale and his Sunday school teachers were right.

He thereafter developed a thirst for knowledge about God and was convinced that

only the Bible had accurate prophecy and a true history of the world. Colin recalled: "This meant that the all-knowing Creator was the God of the Bible and the gods of the other religions were false since they did

not know everything. So I became a six-day creationist, Bible-believing Christian." When he began to live out his faith

and talk with people about Christ, he soon realised that the world was not that easy to convince. "I remember thinking that it would

now be easy for me to lead people to Christ. I thought all they needed to hear was the scientific evidence they had never heard before which points to a Creator, plus the accuracy of Bible prophecy, which points to that Creator being the God of the Bible," Says Colin. "What I didn't realise at the time was that most people don't want to know this and are not really truth seekers, but are in rebellion against God."

He then understood he was in a

spiritual battle, not an intellectual one and recognised the crucial need for prayer. "Prayer is required for

the lost as well as evidence for creation, prophetic accuracy and who Christ is. The Gospel can then be preached and received," he said.

For Colin, the transformation was complete. That young man who for a time believed in the lie that is evolution returned to his foundational Sunday school teaching. God

did what He said He did in the beginning: "created the heavens and the earth" in six, 24-hour days about 6,000 years ago.

Turning human evolution theory upside-down

DNA extracted from a supposedly 400,000-year-old femur (thigh bone) from a Spanish cave "completely changes what we know—or thought we knewabout human evolution".

For one thing, as Professor Chris Stringer of London's Natural History Museum points out, it's "shattered the previous record of 100,000-year-old DNA". (But could DNA have even lasted 100,000 years? The survival of DNA is a major problem for the evolutionary timeline—e.g. see www.creation.com/dino-dna.)


Evolutionists are also surprised that the DNA more closely matched that found in Denisova Cave in Siberia, than that of Neanderthals, in Europe. Professor Allan Cooper, Director of the Australian Centre for Ancient DNA at Adelaide University, was reported as saying this discovery "has turned human evolution theory on its head".

He also said: "Everybody is mixing with everybody else and providing a complete mess at this stage, which, really it's hard to keep up. But it certainly shows, I think, the ways in which we think about species forming and maintaining themselves is probably not that accurate."


As Australia's national broadcaster put it, "Put simply, this find means it's back to the drawing board for evolutionists, trying to trace back to a common ancestor." •

Sex trafficking in the US

She grew up poor, in one of the decaying mill towns of Massachusetts.

After she ran away from home, she was groomed and finally drawn into the dark world of sex trafficking, a virtual prisoner in one of the most free and prosperous countries in the world.

was conceived in a violent rape, so I always felt like I was worth less than other people," says Darlene Pawlik, author of Testimony: the dark side of Christianity. The rape was so brutal her mother didn't talk about it for two years. She actually married the perpetrator, who continued to brutalize Darlene's mother.

Sexual violence seemed to follow Darlene. "From toddlerhood I was physically and sexually abused by my biological father," she recounts. "He used drugs and he used repressive techniques, teaching us to lie about what was going on."

Her mother's second husband took them to church occasionally, but it was more for a social connection. "At

six or seven I accepted the Lord, but there was no discipleship going on. I didn't know how to follow Him."

Darlene ran away from home after her mother's second divorce. "I quit school at the end of the 6th grade," she says. "I lived wandering the streets, stayed in basements, or slept in cars. I slept in the store '24' for a number of months." A world almanac was her only pillow at times.

When Darlene was 13, a handsome man calling himself 'Ace' showed up in town, driving a black Cadillac with a crimson interior. He struck up conversations with Darlene and her runaway friends, slowly building their trust. "When the weather got cold we would get in his car and we would talk and joke around," she

Ace was patient, slowly grooming the girls for his vile purposes. "He

made very few references to sexuality at first, but then he started getting into it more and more."

Darlene began using drugs such as Valium, marijuana, and alcohol anything she could get her hands on. "I viewed him (Ace) as a way I could get what I wanted and I didn't think

I was worth anything anyway," she says. Her relationship turned sexual with Ace, which led to the next step in his sordid

On Darlene's 14th birthday she was peddled into the world of sex trafficking. "That's the first time

I was sold to a businessman from a neighboring town. He was absolutely thrilled I was so young."

Some of her clients included professionals, politicians, and everyday Joes. "Often it was a routine thing that happened," she says, referring to the sexual encounters.

"But there were times when things turned violent. I was gang-raped, kidnapped, beaten and brutalized," she recounts.

"I attempted suicide many times, overdosing on pills; I tried to throw myself off a building; I tried to hang myself in a cell. I must have had angelic or Holy Spirit intervention, because I should not be alive."

Ace sold her to a man named Rac, for his exclusive use. Then Rac sold her to a small-time organized crime figure, involved with loansharking and gambling. The man found her an apartment in the city, while he lived with his wife and children in the suburbs.

I was held as a house pet for a 'sugar daddy,' but there was nothing sweet about it," she notes.

When Darlene unexpectedly became pregnant, the mobster was enraged.

"He told me if I didn't have an abortion he would kill me. One of his flunkies was my former pimp who had beaten me up and raped me so I didn't doubt it." He forced Darlene to

> make the appointment for an abortion in his presence.

As the pressure mounted, Darlene remembered the faith of her childhood, which had been dormant for so many years. "God, if you're real, I need you to help me!" she cried out when she was alone.

"I don't know what to do."

That night something unusual happened. She had a vivid, Technicolor dream about the abortion process from the vantage point of the womb.

Jolted by her God-inspired dream, Darlene called a social worker she met when she first lived on the streets. She reached out to Marilyn Birnie, founder of Friends of the Unborn, who told her she would provide a place of refuge for Darlene – a home for unwed mothers.

Darlene spontaneously devised a plan to flee - using the pretext of a failed abortion. "I pretended to go and have an abortion and after the procedure I pretended to be in pain. I went to the bathroom a lot and cried a lot. I was shaking so much as I was terrified he would find out what was going on. He believed me and let me go.'

She credits Marilyn Birnie with saving her life. "She didn't just save my life, she saved my children's lives and who knows how many generations."

At the home for unwed mothers,

she finally found the missing piece to her Christianity. "Marilyn taught me how to be a Christian, to read the Bible every day, to talk to God every day. If there was an actual conversion experience, it was at her home. She saved my life and my destiny."

In 1990, at 23, Darlene married Mark Pawlik, sales manager for an industrial equipment company. The relationship was slow to develop and rocky at first, due to the trauma she survived and her lack of self-worth. "I felt like I wasn't good enough so I pushed him away."

Darlene has been a practicing nurse for 26 years and worked in Pro-life ministry for more than 22 years. She has five children and two grandchildren.

"I want to give back to the prolifers who saved me," she says.

A WOMAN in my church was recently diagnosed with breast cancer around the time she was told she was pregnant with twins. She was advised to abort the babies and get immediate surgery and chemotherapy.

What a ghastly choice to face – kill your unborn babies and try to save your life for the sake of your husband and seven small children, or continue with the pregnancy and potentially end up dying and leaving your young family to fend for themselves.

This year another mother in the US was faced with the same decision. Michigan mother Carrie DeKlyen was diagnosed with a terminal brain tumour and then found out she was pregnant with child number six.

Carrie chose not to abort and died three days after her daughter was born. Sadly her baby, born at 24 weeks gestation, only lived a few

Did Carrie make the right choice? Would she have decided the same way knowing the outcome? What about her poor husband, left with heartbreak, doubt and kids to raise on his own? Would he have made the same choice again?

The woman I know also chose to forgo treatment for the sake of her unborn. She now has two bouncing, healthy girls, but her own health is not good and the outcome may still be a sad one.

How does one weigh the value of a life? Is an adult life with responsibilities and dependants worth more than an unknown life that is yet a few cells? Logically it would seem so. However, the Bible,

which guided both these women in their decisions, teaches that life begins at conception and that every life is equally valuable.

Psalm 139: 13-16 says, "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to

These women chose to voluntarily lay down their lives, rather than take the life of another. They had a choice and they used their strength to protect the weak who had no voice.

I'm glad that I am too old to ever have to face such an awful dilemma but I admire their courage and I believe they will be eternally rewarded for following the loving example of their Savior. Jesus said, "Greater love has no one than this: to lav down one's life for one's friends" and then He went to the cross to lay down His life to pay for the sins of us all.

Carrie's husband said: "I have no explanation of why this happened, but I do know Jesus loves us and someday we will know why."

To some people these women's choices may seem foolish or foolhardy but they both understand this life is a blink in eternity and that "he is no fool who gives what he cannot keep [his life] to gain what he cannot lose [God's eternal reward]" (Jim Elliot).

DON'T FAKE IT THIS FEBRUARY



BECAUSE our little dog, Carrie, gets such terrible skin rashes, sometimes I have to give her a cortisone tablet, or an antihistamine.

She is pretty good about taking tablets; she rolls on her back and I open her mouth and put it as far down her throat as I can, then I rub her neck to make her swallow. Usually this works.

Sometimes though, she moves the tablet to the side of her mouth and then spits it on the carpet when I am not looking!

I try to make the whole process as painless as possible but maybe she does not realise (she is a dog after all!) that the ordeal is not a punishment but is ultimately for her benefit - I am trying to stop her being so itchy!



It made me think that sometimes I behave like this when God tries to give me a dose of His good medicine in the form of a bout of sickness, an unanswered prayer, a difficult relationship.

It might taste bitter to me at the time and feel uncomfortable to take. I fight against God and want to spit the situation out. I might think it is some sort of punishment, but perhaps if I could only see from God's perspective, I would realise that ultimately it is for my benefit and will be a blessing to me. A short inconvenience for long-term rewards.

I do explain to Carrie what I am doing when I give her the pills but she has no framework in which to understand me. Likewise, as a mere mortal bound by time and space and filled with my own selfish perspective, I probably would not understand what God was doing, even if He explained Himself.

Like Carrie, I just have to trust my Master and know that because my Master loves me and is the giver of good things, whatever He gives me must be the best thing for me at the time.

Trust God, He is not being cruel but infinitely tender in His dealings with you.

No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it.

The movie Amazing Love: The Story of Hosea reminds us that we in fact are. Even when we manifestly don't deserve it.

It is the beautiful portrayal of the Bible prophet Hosea and his unfailing love for his prostitute wife, as told to a group at a youth camp.

Sean Astin (best known for his role as Samwise Gamgee in The Lord of the Rings) plays Pastor Stuart, who takes a group of his church's teenagers on a trip into the great outdoors. Joining them is unchurched and troubled Ashlev who feels left out and misunderstood by the others. Stuart uses the group's infighting as an opening to tell them Hosea's story, about a man who keeps forgiving his unfaithful wife and taking her back although she claims she will "never be tamed".

The Bible uses this as an illustration of God's unconditional, all-forgiving



love for His people, who keep betraying Him by following other gods and sinning, but whom He continues to woo back to Himself. As Austin's character says "It is a picture of God's amazing love for us."

The movie interweaves scenes from the modern-day camp ground and the dynamics between the teenag-

ers, with scenes set in ancient Israel between Hosea and his bride Gomer. It has some good acting (although also some predictably typecast characters), beautiful scenery, and a deep and powerful plot. This movie is mature, yet with no

sex scenes, violence, or profanity. It is however, not really suitable for young children, as it deals with themes of prostitution and adultery. And make sure you have those tissues handy!

Whether you have someone to spoil you or not, this Valentine's, know that there is a God who deeply values and longs for relationship with you.

TIM BEATS TOURETTES



aking a World Cup record of 16 goal saves against Belgium in Brazil in 2014, Team USA goalkeeper Tim Howard became a social media phenomenon, prompting a new nickname 'The Minister of Defence' and a congratulatory call from US Secretary of Defence Chuck Hagel, even as USA was knocked out by a 2-1 loss.

A 6'-3" (187cm), 210-pound full-bearded 35-year-old, and English

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club Everton keeper, says the most important skill for a keeper is "explosive power".

"Some people are born with it naturally, and some people need to develop that," Tim shared with FCA.org. "Every move that a goalkeeper makes is an explosive movement. You're either idling or you're wide open."

Tim says that mental toughness is also essential for keepers.

"That mental fortitude is important as a goalkeeper—to believe in yourself and be mentally strong and able to handle criticism. ...It's a hard position... [as] there is no second chance. If the ball goes behind you, it's a really, really bad thing.

"To be able to deal and cope with [criticism] has been a challenge. But it's because of my faith that I have

been able to stay grounded."

Among million-dollar pay packets and fame, Tim explains, "it's very easy to lose focus and not stay grounded and forget about humility. That's the one thing I've always clung tightly to—the fact that it is important to me to stay humble... For me, that has been the biggest anchor I have had through my faith."

Howard has drawn on his faith to cope with an illness called Tourette's syndrome. He has also given

> much of his time to helping others with the same condition, winning a humanitarian award in 2001 for his work with children with Tourette's.

> He says: "At age ten, I was diagnosed with this neurological disorder, characterised by physical and verbal tics. Living with Tourette's is not easy. It affects me

all the time, even when I'm playing. And even if it's not seen by someone looking on, it's something I have to deal with on a 24-hour basis. I have been able to cope pretty well with it. I've had it for a while now, so you learn to deal with it.

"But God has blessed me with the gift of athleticism as well. He has done some powerful things in my life through the combination of these two gifts. Not only has He helped me earn a place in the top English league, He also has shown me ways to use my position to encourage others with Tourette's."

As a child, Howard saw the effect of faith in his grandmother's life, and it greatly impacted him: "Nana's sense of peace was so powerful because it came from her faith in the Lord.

"In the midst of any storm, she had so much peace, which clearly came from one source: God.

"Through her, God revealed His love for me and it wasn't long before I was following in her footsteps. I wanted the same sense of faith and peace she had, and that is exactly what God gave me."

In a YouTube video entitled "His Decision", Tim Howard shares, "I came to the point when I was tired of being on the fence, when I didn't want to just talk about knowing God, or pretend like I knew God – but I wanted to actually live for Him, live with Him. And I just basically asked Him into my heart.

"It's as easy as ABC, because that was how it was taught to me. Accept (you are a sinner), believe (Jesus died for your sins) and confess (that Jesus is Lord of all). If you do it wholeheartedly, with all your heart and all your soul. I would say that's the first step. It's just believing in your heart that God is Lord.

"My faith in the Lord is vitally important," Tim shares with Ath-

letes in Action. "The joy I have in my life doesn't come from soccer, the winning and the losing. I have an amazing family and we share an amazing faith together.

"Faith is a joyous thing, something to be shared. I don't want it in the background of my life, but I certainly don't want it to be 'in your face', either. I just want to be open about it

"Today, I am blessed to be living a dream. And yet, if it all went away tomorrow, I know I would still have peace.

"That probably sounds crazy to most people, but that's the kind of peace Christ gives. It is rooted in His love, and it surpasses all understanding. You can experience this same sense of love and peace too. All you have to do is ask for it."

Howard says he really wants to be known as someone who lived for Jesus Christ; "who didn't always get it right, and who made mistakes and stumbled, but at the end of the day, believed and had faith that God is the beginning and the end.

"People are going to see your stumbles, but if people can look at me and see Christ and not just see me, that is of the utmost importance.

"The most important thing in my life is Christ. He's more important to me than winning or losing or whether I'm playing or not. Everything else is just a bonus."

And for the US World Cup team, Howard was certainly a bonus. •

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
